Weddings: Arrangements are to be made at least one year in advance by calling the parish office.



Sunday Gospel Reflection:

In this Sunday's gospel, Jesus says that He is the 'true vine," and his Father the "vine grower" who prunes the trees to make them more fruitful. He also described those who belong to him as "already pruned." By describing himself as the "true vine," Jesus separates himself from false vines. It is another way of telling us that he is the true source of life. It is a cautionary note to those who might be inclined to pin their hope on earthly life, incapable of offering enduring happiness and fulfillment. Jesus is telling us that he is the source of real life that endures and leads to real happiness and fulfillment.

Jesus further describes himself as "the vine" and his followers as "the branches." He is not 'a' vine but 'the' vine. It is another way of separating himself from other vines. For the branches to be fruitful, they have to be attached to the vine. Just as a branch cut off from the tree dries up and dies, those cut off from Jesus have no claim to life. To stay alive, one needs to remain attached to Jesus, the True Vine. From him we draw essential nourishment for life. Jesus nourishes us through the church's sacraments, especially the Holy Eucharist where we are nourished with his word, body and blood.

The theologian, Hans Urs Von Balthasar states that "The parable of the vine conveys a marvelous sense of assurance." It means that we are not "dependent solely on our fragile selves," but united with Jesus, "we can lead a useful and meaningful existence." He goes on to say that along with that assurance is the requirement, "Remain in me, as I remain in you" as we heard in today's gospel. This mandate is so urgent that one who does not remain in him withers and is pruned off and burned. The latter is a very scary thought for those who exercise their freedom by walking away from the church or abandoning their relationship with God.

Additional Reflection:

My friend and fellow pastor, Father Paul, noticed unsightly, overgrown trees near his parish church. He asked the maintenance crew to cut back the growth, which they happily did, telling him the trees would be much healthier and even fuller after a good pruning. A few days later, Father Paul received a letter from an irate man in the neighborhood who wrote, "Jesus would never prune trees like that. He loves trees, unlike you."

I suspect that the neighbor was not familiar with this week's Gospel in which Jesus says of his Father, "He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit" (John 15:2) I don't mean to pick too much on that fellow. He was perhaps ignorant of arboriculture. But I'd wager his main confusion was the pruning and removing quality of God's love. That confusion afflicts us all to some degree, doesn't it? It is just so darn easy to react negatively when God cuts something out of our lives and assume it's not his work at all. In the moment, all we see is the loss, and not the loving desire for future flourishing.

The cross is the great pruning of Christ's body. Jesus' rising is the brand-new growth. It is God's promise to us that all the painful pruning in life is leading us somewhere beautiful. What has been cut back or out in your life? A friend, an opportunity, a sense of certainty, a job, health, a relationship? This week, offer those dry branches to the one who lovingly prunes us in order to make our lives burst with verdant growth.
