



## **Pastor's Sunday Reflection**

In this Sunday's gospel, we read about the mission of the twelve apostles. As spiritual apprentices, they learned from their master the ways of the kingdom. When the time was right, Jesus sent them out two by two, and gave them authority over the enemy. He also gave them power to perform signs and wonders essential to the mission.

Jesus instructed the apostles not to take anything except walking stick and sandals. They needed walking stick and sandals in traversing the rugged terrain of Palestine and surrounding regions. We may wonder why they were not to bring along essentials like food, money, or extra clothing. These are things we would consider necessary for surviving their uncertain adventure. However, Jesus intended to teach the apostles a lesson about trust and reliance on divine providence. They were to trust that God would provide for them through the generosity of those who welcome them.

Jesus also taught them to avoid being naïve in thinking that everyone would be welcoming. He cautioned that while some will welcome them, others would reject them. They were to stay wherever they felt welcomed. However, where they were not welcomed, they were to leave and shake the dust off their feet in testimony against the city and its people. This sense of judgment on those who reject God's messengers is addressed by all three synoptic gospels and Acts (See Mark 6:11, Matthew 10:13, Luke 10:11, and Acts 13:51). The practice of shaking dust of one's feet could also mean shaking off hurt and resentment that come from rejection in order to continue ministering with peace of mind.

Like the apostles, Jesus is sending us into the world to proclaim the good news. As with his apostles, he is not giving us false hope by promising that everything would be wonderful. On the contrary, he is real with us by cautioning that not everyone will be welcoming. We have to trust that God would take care of us through the kind disposition of some people of faith. Obviously, not everyone in Jesus' time welcomed his ministry despite the accompanying miracles. Their rejection even culminated in murderous rage that gave us the cross as a symbol of God's love.

## **EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP**

In my experience, there are two kinds of people: the folks who kick off their shoes the second they walk through the door, and the ones who don't.

People can feel strongly about this on both sides. The main thrust of the Shoes-Off Brigade seems to be this: we track a lot of weird stuff on the soles of our feet. Little reminders of all the places we've been — whether it's a private home or a public bathroom — cling to our shoes long after we leave.

This same theory applies to our spiritual lives. As human beings and as disciples, we visit a lot of figurative towns and pick up a lot of figurative dust. Sinfulness. Shame. Defeat. Anger. Fear. Doubt. No matter how hard we try to keep free of it, these things have a way of attaching themselves to us, sometimes without us even noticing. We need to take a good look at what unhelpful and unconstructive baggage from our past we're tracking into our present and future encounters.

What is the "town" God is asking you to visit today in His name? Is it a tough conversation with a friend, a brief witness to a stranger in the checkout line, a call to be present to someone in your family? Before you go, remember, shake off the dust. Don't let a past disappointment constrain you. Don't allow yesterday's failures or burdens to keep you from the joy of today's witness, whatever form it might take.
