

Pastor's Gospel Reflection

In this Sunday's gospel, Jesus teaches about "the kingdom of God." "The kingdom of God," Regnum Dei in Latin, is one of those phrases unique to the New Testament. Often, people use the phrase interchangeably with "the kingdom of Heaven," Regnum Caelorum in Latin. The use of the phrase is limited to Matthew's gospel. It appears thirty-two times in Matthew's gospel and nowhere else. Some believe that Matthew preferred using "the kingdom of Heaven" because his Jewish background, imposed restrictions on the frequent use of God's name. The phrase, "the kingdom of God," does not appear in the Old Testament, though there are references to "His Kingdom" or "Your Kingdom."

There are two related eschatological approaches to understanding the phrase, "the kingdom of God." First, we can understand it in terms of "Realized Eschatology," which sees the Kingdom of God in non-apocalyptic terms as the manifestation of divine sovereignty over the world. According to this approach, Jesus' ministry implied the realization of God's divine sovereignty.

A competing approach sees "the kingdom of God" in terms of "Inaugurated Eschatology," which is often summed up as "already and not yet fully." It sees the Kingdom of God as already present in the ministry of Christ and the Church. However, the fullness of the kingdom would be realized when we meet God face to face to share his glory.

In this Sunday's gospel, Jesus explains the kingdom in agricultural terms. First, he invokes the image of a farmer who scatters seeds and goes about his daily routine. He sleeps and rises in the morning while the seed sprouts and grows without him knowing how. When it is harvest time, he proceeds to harvest the crops and reaps the benefits. It implies that the kingdom of God is not dependent on human efforts. The farmer in the parable simply scattered the seeds and went about his daily business while waiting for harvest time. There was no weeding involved, no watering, no fertilizing, et cetera. The germination and growth of the seeds scattered do not depend on his efforts, but on God who provides the soil, the sun and the rain. The parable also implies that the kingdom of God is dynamic, growing from simple seed to full crop.

Secondly, to underscore the dynamism of the kingdom of God, Jesus compares it to a mustard seed, described as "the smallest of seeds on the earth," that grows to become one of the tallest trees. Well, it may not actually be the smallest seed on earth, but that is beside the point. Jesus wants us to imagine how something so small could grow to become "the largest of plants" (exaggerated to drive home a message). The point is that the kingdom of God is alive and grows like the mustard plant to provide shelter to animals and birds. We contribute to the growth of the kingdom through personal faith, evangelization, charitable works, and pursuit of peace and justice.

The kingdom of God grows when people respond to the gospel message and turn their lives around. The kingdom

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grows when we embrace love and forgiveness and teach the same to our children and grandchildren. That the Church is where it is today despite years of persecution is evidence of the growth of the kingdom. The kingdom will continue to grow as long as people of faith are committed to living the faith and passing on the gospel message by words and deed.
