**Communal** - Last Sunday of the month **Individual** - Any time and also by appointment.


Baptisms: Call the parish office to set up appointment.

# **Pastor's Sunday Reflection**

As we draw closer to the end of the liturgical year, eschatological themes dominate the readings. This Sunday is no different since we are only a week from the end of the current liturgical year and two weeks from the beginning of Advent and a new liturgical year. Eschatological themes serve to remind us that the end will come someday. Hence, the need for adequate preparation to ensure that one is not caught off-guard.

The very thought of the world coming to an end is quite a frightening proposition. In the first reading, Daniel describes the end of time as unsurpassed in distress since nations began. He says that the dead would be raised. Some shall live forever while others shall be an everlasting horror and disgrace. The good news is that the wise shall shine brightly like the splendor of the firmament. Daniel describes the wise as people who lead many to justice and whom God will find worthy of his promises. We could extrapolate that embracing God and his Church would be the greatest proof of wisdom. Likewise, rejecting God and the Church would be the greatest act of foolishness.

This part of the book of Daniel falls under a literary genre referred to as apocalyptic writings. The genre makes extensive use of poetry and prose, and engages the imagination and emotions. The idea is to scare people into recognizing the horrors of sin and the devastation that sin brings. Contemplating the horrors of sin moves one's heart to seek redemption in God.

The description of the end of time contained in this Sunday's gospel is even more terrifying. It describes the darkening of the sun and moon, and stars falling from the sky. It is reminiscent of some predictions of the end-time by some scientists. One of the many theories involves the expansion, contraction, and implosion of the Sun. They make references to gamma rays and describe horrific consequences that will involve the termination of all life on earth. The accuracy of these predictions still remains to be seen, but who wants to stick around to find out what may happen in several million years?

Given the various predictions of doomsday, it is hard not to think that the world is generally consumed with eschatology. Some doomsday preppers have built bunkers they believe would withstand the impending doom. They stockpile water, food, and survival kits, and arm themselves to prevent intrusion from the "unwise" who failed to prepare.

Obviously, modern doomsday prophets never learn. Despite being proven wrong countless times over the centuries, they continue to make predictions with certitude and audacity. They cite the ancient Mayan calendar, Chinese calendar, astronomical and astrological calculations, etc. Recall the prediction that the world would end in December 2012. The world is still standing. It would be great if someone held them accountable for misleading people or at least compel them to publicly acknowledge that they were wrong.


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### 33RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

People of faith ought not be concerned about when the world would end. Rather, we ought to be more concerned with living our faith day-by-day. In the gospel, Jesus states: "But of that day or hour, no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father." Since we do not know when the end would come, the best we could do is to prepare ourselves spiritually than trying to save our skins like the doomsday preppers. We ought to be more concerned with saving our souls. A person's world comes to an end when they take that last breath. That is when the new world begins.
