Dear Parishioners,

Sunday Reflection:



In this Sunday's gospel, Jesus and his disciples return to his native place. He must have been excited about returning home and sharing his wonderful gifts and talents with his town's people. On the Sabbath, he went to the synagogue and taught them with great wisdom and unmatched eloquence. Obviously, he did not find the familiar faces of his hometown people intimidating.

Given Jesus' popularity, one would think his hometown folks would be delighted to see him. There is not much in the passage to suggest that his people were not happy to see him home. However, they were amazed at his wisdom and eloquence. Rather than celebrate his outstanding gifts, they turned to skepticism. They wondered where and how he could have received all that education and power to perform miracles.

They could not get beyond the fact that he was the carpenter, the son of Mary, and that they knew his brothers and sisters. Note that "brothers and sisters" are generic terms that included cousins and other extended family members. Some falsely refer to this passage to argue that Mary had other children. Rather than celebrate his gifts and talents, Jesus' hometown people took offense at him. Their lack of faith amazed him, prompting him to utter a familiar phrase - "A prophet is not without honor except in his native place and among his own kin and in his own house." There is a new way of stating it - "familiarity breeds contempt." We pray that our familiarity with one another as a community of faith would lead to greater love, not contempt.
